- Focus remains on personal choices
- Religious routine



the historical discipleship path

 - Elijah Elisha
 - Paul Timothy











discipleship in the Greco-Roman culture

- The Greek word $\mu\alpha\theta\eta\tau\dot{\eta}\varsigma$ was used by Socrates, Plato, Aristotle centuries before Jesus
 - Learner/trainee
 - Pupil/apprentice
 - Disciple/adherent
- Direct contact with the teacher, however, was not a prerequisite to following his teachings.



discipleship in the 1st century Jewish culture

- Commitment to well-known teachers or movements
- Training was done in community, having the Torah as the center of the learning process





discipleship in the 1st century Jewish culture

- Commitment to well-known teachers or movements
- Training was done in community, having the Torah as the center of the learning process
- Paul Gamaliel (Acts 5:34; 22:3)
- Devotion to follow a prominent teacher, carrying on his teachings, and imitating his life.



discipleship in the 1st century Jewish culture

- In the Hebrew context, discipleship meant much more than just the sharing of cognitive information, but also one's life experience—within the context of community, starting in the family and then to others.
- It indicated not only the acceptance of the master's values and embracing his principles, but ultimately reproducing his ideas and beliefs in practical ways.





following the Master

- Christ taught us that having faith means to follow.
- This is the first test of faith.
- This is the basic presupposition of discipleship.
